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YOUR ROLE AS A CAREGIVER

If you're reading this, you've stepped up to make sure your loved one gets the care and support they need while they are fighting extensive-stage small cell lung cancer (ES-SCLC). Thank you for being there for your loved one.

This guide provides tips on how to keep strong while you're lending a hand. It also offers suggestions and links to sites with information and resources that you may find useful in your role as a caregiver.

This guide is not intended to replace a conversation with a doctor. It is intended as a resource to provide information.

WHAT IS TECENTRIQ?

TECENTRIQ is a prescription medicine used to treat:

Adults with a type of lung cancer called small cell lung cancer (SCLC). TECENTRIQ may be used with the chemotherapy medicines carboplatin and etoposide as your first treatment when your lung cancer: • is a type called "extensive-stage small cell lung cancer," which means that it has spread or grown.

It is not known if TECENTRIQ is safe and effective when used: In children for the treatment of SCLC



PROVIDING PRACTICAL SUPPORT

Your role as a caregiver will probably include helping your loved one with the things they need to do every day. This could include physical tasks as well as help finding information when they need it.



- Help note any changes in symptoms or side effects
- Keep track of medical information and paperwork
- Monitor instructions and treatment tips from the healthcare team







PROVIDING EMOTIONAL SUPPORT

Of course, practical help is important, but it may be just as important to just be there and provide emotional support.

- Try to keep a positive attitude-it is beneficial for your loved one and for you
- Spend quality time together
- Do things that remind you both that you have a relationship separate from your loved one's diagnosis
- Encourage your loved one to take time for activities they love, when possible and within their limits

THE VALUE OF COMMUNICATION

Sometimes just being there to talk and listen can make a big difference.

The more you know about your loved one and how they're feeling, the better prepared you'll be to help them.



Here are some different ways to help create a healthy dialogue:

- Ask if it's a good time to talk
- Listen, and don't interrupt
- Think about what you want to say in advance
- Remember that you can have more than one talk
- Don't always say, "It'll be okay"
- Speak from the heart

THE HEALTHCARE TEAM

Your loved one will likely have access to a combination of healthcare providers, or HCPs. Your loved one's care team may include some or all of the following HCPs and may change over their treatment journey.

CORE MEDICAL TEAM			
Oncologist	Infusion Nurse		
An oncologist is a doctor who specializes in diagnosing and treating cancers with medicines, including chemotherapy, immunotherapy, and other therapies. They manage cancer treatment and coordinate with the entire treatment team.	These nurses work to prepare and administer infused medications.		
Primary Care Physician	Nurse Practitioners/Physician Assistants		
Sometimes known as an internist, a general practitioner, or the family doctor, the primary care physician may be the initial point of contact. They may refer patients to other specialists.	These healthcare providers have degrees and training in medical fields. Both help treat illnesses, provide patient education, and some may prescribe medications. They also manage the primary care needs of patients and their families		

in partnership with their physician.



HOW IS TECENTRIQ GIVEN?

A healthcare provider will give your loved one TECENTRIQ into their vein through an intravenous (IV) line. They will also decide how long your loved one may be on treatment. If at any point the disease progresses or treatments can't be tolerated, infusions will be stopped.



*TECENTRIQ will be given as 840 mg every 2 weeks, 1200 mg every 3 weeks, or 1680 mg every 4 weeks.

PREPARING FOR INFUSIONS

If you're attending infusion appointments with your loved one, here are some tips to make the time pass by more quickly and comfortably for you both.







Understanding the potential serious side effects of treatment is essential. Knowing the symptoms to identify can help prepare you if and when it may be time to call your loved one's healthcare provider. Review the Important Safety Information below on your own or with your loved one.

IMPORTANT SAFETY INFORMATION

What is the most important information about TECENTRIQ?

TECENTRIQ can cause your immune system to attack normal organs and tissues in any area of your body and can affect the way they work. These problems can sometimes become severe or life-threatening and can lead to death. You can have more than one of these problems at the same time. These problems may happen anytime during your treatment or even after your treatment has ended.

Call or see your healthcare provider right away if you develop any new or worse signs or symptoms, including:

Lung problems

• cough

- shortness of breath
- chest pain

Intestinal problems

- diarrhea (loose stools) or more frequent bowel movements than usual
- stools that are black, tarry, sticky, or have blood or mucus
- severe stomach-area (abdomen) pain or tenderness

Liver problems

- yellowing of your skin or the whites of your eyes
- severe nausea or vomiting

Hormone gland problems

- headaches that will not go away or unusual headaches
- eye sensitivity to light
- eye problems
- rapid heartbeat
- increased sweating
- extreme tiredness
- weight gain or weight loss

- pain on the right side of your stomach area (abdomen)
- dark urine (tea colored)
- feeling more hungry or thirsty than usual
- urinating more often than usual
- hair loss
- feeling cold
- constipation
- your voice gets deeper

- bleeding or bruising more easily than normal
- dizziness or fainting
- changes in mood or behavior, such as decreased sex drive, irritability, or forgetfulness





IMPORTANT SAFETY INFORMATION CONT.

Kidney problems

- decrease in your amount of urine
- blood in your urine

Skin problems

- rash
- itching
- skin blistering or peeling
- painful sores or ulcers in mouth or nose, throat, or genital area

Problems can also happen in other organs.

- swelling of your ankles
- loss of appetite
- fever or flu-like symptoms
- swollen lymph nodes

These are not all of the signs and symptoms of immune system problems that can happen with TECENTRIQ. Call or see your healthcare provider right away for any new or worse signs or symptoms, including:

- Chest pain, irregular heartbeat, shortness of breath, or swelling of ankles
- Confusion, sleepiness, memory problems, changes in mood or behavior, stiff neck, balance problems, tingling or numbness of the arms or legs
- Double vision, blurry vision, sensitivity to light, eye pain, changes in eyesight
- · Persistent or severe muscle pain or weakness, muscle cramps
- Low red blood cells, bruising

Infusion reactions that can sometimes be severe or life-threatening. Signs and symptoms of infusion reactions may include:

- chills or shaking
- itching or rash
- flushing
- shortness of breath or wheezing
- dizziness
- feeling like passing out
- fever
- back or neck pain





IMPORTANT SAFETY INFORMATION CONT.

Complications, including graft-versus-host disease (GVHD), in people who have received a bone marrow (stem cell) transplant that uses donor stem cells (allogeneic). These complications can be serious and can lead to death. These complications may happen if you underwent transplantation either before or after being treated with TECENTRIQ. Your healthcare provider will monitor you for these complications.

Getting medical treatment right away may help keep these problems from becoming more serious. Your healthcare provider will check you for these problems during your treatment with TECENTRIQ. Your healthcare provider may treat you with corticosteroid or hormone replacement medicines. Your healthcare provider may also need to delay or completely stop treatment with TECENTRIQ if you have severe side effects.

Before you receive TECENTRIQ, tell your healthcare provider about all of your medical conditions, including if you:

- have immune system problems such as Crohn's disease, ulcerative colitis, or lupus
- have received an organ transplant
- have received or plan to receive a stem cell transplant that uses donor stem cells (allogeneic)
- have received radiation treatment to your chest area
- have a condition that affects your nervous system, such as myasthenia gravis or Guillain-Barré syndrome
- are pregnant or plan to become pregnant. TECENTRIQ can harm your unborn baby. Tell your healthcare provider right away if you become pregnant or think you may be pregnant during treatment with TECENTRIQ. **Females who are able to become pregnant:**
 - Your healthcare provider should do a pregnancy test before you start treatment with TECENTRIQ.
 - You should use an effective method of birth control during your treatment and for at least 5 months after the last dose of TECENTRIQ.
- are breastfeeding or plan to breastfeed. It is not known if TECENTRIQ passes into your breast milk. Do not breastfeed during treatment and for at least 5 months after the last dose of TECENTRIQ.

Tell your healthcare provider about all the medicines you take, including prescription and over-the-counter medicines, vitamins, and herbal supplements.





IMPORTANT SAFETY INFORMATION CONT.

The most common side effects of TECENTRIQ when used in lung cancer with other anti-cancer medicines include:

- feeling tired or weak
- nausea
- hair loss
- constipation
- diarrhea
- decreased appetite

TECENTRIQ may cause fertility problems in females, which may affect the ability to have children. Talk to your healthcare provider if you have concerns about fertility.

These are not all the possible side effects of TECENTRIQ. Ask your healthcare provider or pharmacist for more information about the benefits and side effects of TECENTRIQ.

THE GENENTECH ONCOLOGY CO-PAY ASSISTANCE PROGRAM

The Genentech Oncology Co-pay Program helps you if you have commercial health insurance and meet other eligibility criteria.



No physical card needed; patients simply need their Member ID.

The Co-pay Program is valid ONLY for patients with commercial (private or non-governmental) insurance who have a valid prescription for a Food and Drug Administration (FDA)-approved indication of a Genentech medicine. Patients using Medicare, Medicaid or any other federal or state government program (collectively, "Government Programs") to pay for their Genentech medicine are not eligible.

Under the Program, the patient may pay a co-pay. The final amount owed by a patient may be as little as \$0 for the Genentech medicine (see Program specific details). The total patient out-of-pocket cost is dependent on the patient's health insurance plan. The Program assists with the cost of the Genentech medicine only. It does not assist with the cost of other medicines, procedures or office visit fees. After reaching the maximum annual Program benefit amount, the patient will be responsible for all remaining out-of-pocket expenses. The Program benefit amount cannot exceed the patient's out-of-pocket expenses for the cost associated with the Genentech medicine.

All participants are responsible for reporting the receipt of all Program benefits as required by any insurer or by law. The Program is only valid in the United States and U.S. Territories, is void where prohibited by law and shall follow state restrictions in relation to AB-rated generic equivalents (e.g., MA, CA) where applicable. No party may seek reimbursement for all or any part of the benefit received through the Program. The Program is intended for the patient. Only the patient using the Program may receive the funds made available through the Program. The Program is not intended for third parties who reduce the amount available to the patient or take a portion for their own purposes. Patients with health plans that redirect Genentech Program assistance intended for patient out- of-pocket costs may be subject to alternate Program benefit structures. Genentech reserves the right to rescind, revoke or amend the Program without notice at any time.
